I. INTRODUCTIONS AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES

***It was moved by Mr. Klynstra, supported by Ms. Elisa Hoekwater to approve the April 25, 2022 meeting minutes as written. Motion carried.

II. PUBLIC COMMENTS

III. TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

A. FY23-26 TIP –Mr. Miller shared the action needed today for the FY23-26 Transportation Improvement Program. Mr. Latham provided additional details on the process of developing this document over the past several months.

***It was moved by Mr. Bird, supported by Mr. Nienhuis to adopt the FY2023-2026 Transportation Improvement Program and approve Resolution #22-02. Motion carried.

- B. FY23UWP Mr. Miller presented the action needed today for the FY23 Unified Work Program. Mr. Latham shared the minor changes made in the document since last presented.
- ***It was moved by Ms. Hoekwater, supported by Mr. Sabatino to adopt the FY2023 Unified Work Program and approve Resolution #22-03. Motion carried.
- C. FY20-23 TIP Amendments Mr. Miller presented the action needed today to update the current Transportation Improvement Program. He shared details on the minor changes involved. Mr. Kent and Ms. Hoekwater provided additional details.

***It was moved by Mr. Bocks, supported by Mr. Oonk to approve the FY2020-2023 TIP amendments as presented. Motion carried.

- D. Air Quality Conformity Analysis: Ottawa and Allegan County Mr. Miller presented the action needed today to adopt the Air Quality Conformity Analyses for Ottawa and Allegan counties. Mr. Latham provided additional details on our transportation program meets requirements for air quality regulations as they pertain to transportation projects. Discussion followed about the air quality definitions, monitoring station locations, and the source of air contaminants.
- ***It was moved by Ms. Cooper, supported by Ms. Howell to adopt the Air Quality Conformity Analysis for Allegan County and approve Resolution #22-04. Motion carried.
- ***It was moved by Mr. Bocks, supported by Ms. Cooper to adopt the Air Quality Conformity Analysis for Ottawa County and approve Resolution #22-05. Motion carried.
- E. MDOT/FHWA Comments Mr. Kent shared an update on the progress of transportation projects being done in the area, and selection and timeline of future projects.

IV. ADMINISTRATIVE ISSUES

- A. Adopt FY23 Budget Mr. Latham shared highlights of next year's proposed budget. There were no major changes.
- ***It was moved by Mr. Nienhuis, supported by Mr. Oonk to approve the FY2023 budget as presented. Motion carried.
- B. Financial Report Mr. Latham shared that with the hiring of Eric Dykstra, we will be able to provide better mapping of transportation projects, which will improve our public outreach, and utilize more of the consolidated planning funding.
- C. MACC Executive Committee Report approve Employee Handbook clarification: Dental Set-Aside available for Vision Mr. Latham shared that the change allows the "set aside" to be used for dental <u>or</u> vision. He also shared the efforts staff has made toward partnering with MDOT staff, discussion on future trail crossings on BL- 196.
- D. Staff update Mr. Latham introduced the new GIS Specialist/Transportation Planner Eric Dykstra --- now fully staffed!

VI. MEMBERS' COMMENTS

A. Host sharing about their community - Mr. Bocks shared highlights of happenings in the city of Holland. Tulip Time Festival recorded a record number of approximately 500,000 visitors total, and Windmill Island alone recorded 75,000 visitors. The Tulip Dig garnered \$13,500 (at \$10/bucket of pulled tulip bulbs) which went to a local charity. A skating rink at Window on the Waterfront is

in the works thanks to a million dollar donation by Frank Kraii, a retired school teacher. College Avenue will be extended north, and the Holland BPW Unit 6 generating unit will be removed. A broadband millage is set for the August elections, which will provide the main pathway for broadband availability to every residence in the city of Holland. Partnerships with surrounding townships are also welcome.

B. Member questions or comments – Ms. Hoekwater clarified cost information on the MAX transit facility renovation now being funded due to changes in the FY20-23 TIP discussed in item III.C. above, and shared that a \$400,000 grant has been awarded to MAX Transit for investigating ways to improve bus service in the greater Macatawa area.

VII. OTHER ISSUES AND ADJOURNMENT

***It was moved by Ms. Cooper, supported by Mr. Bocks to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried.

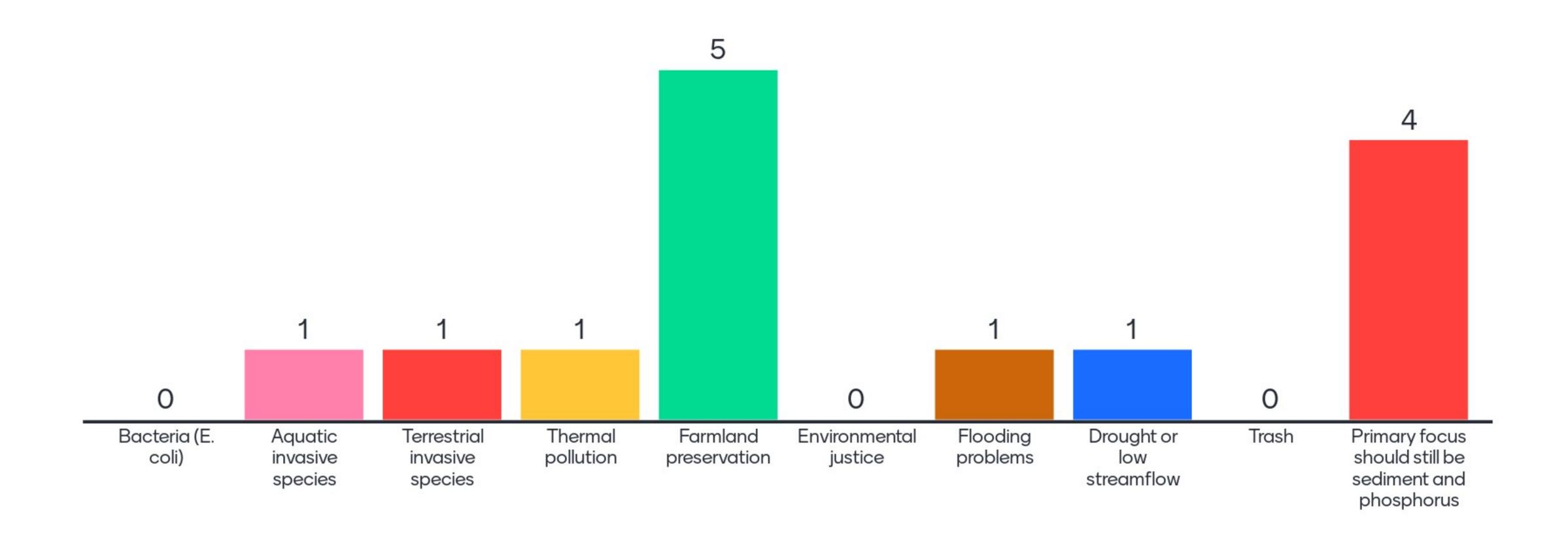

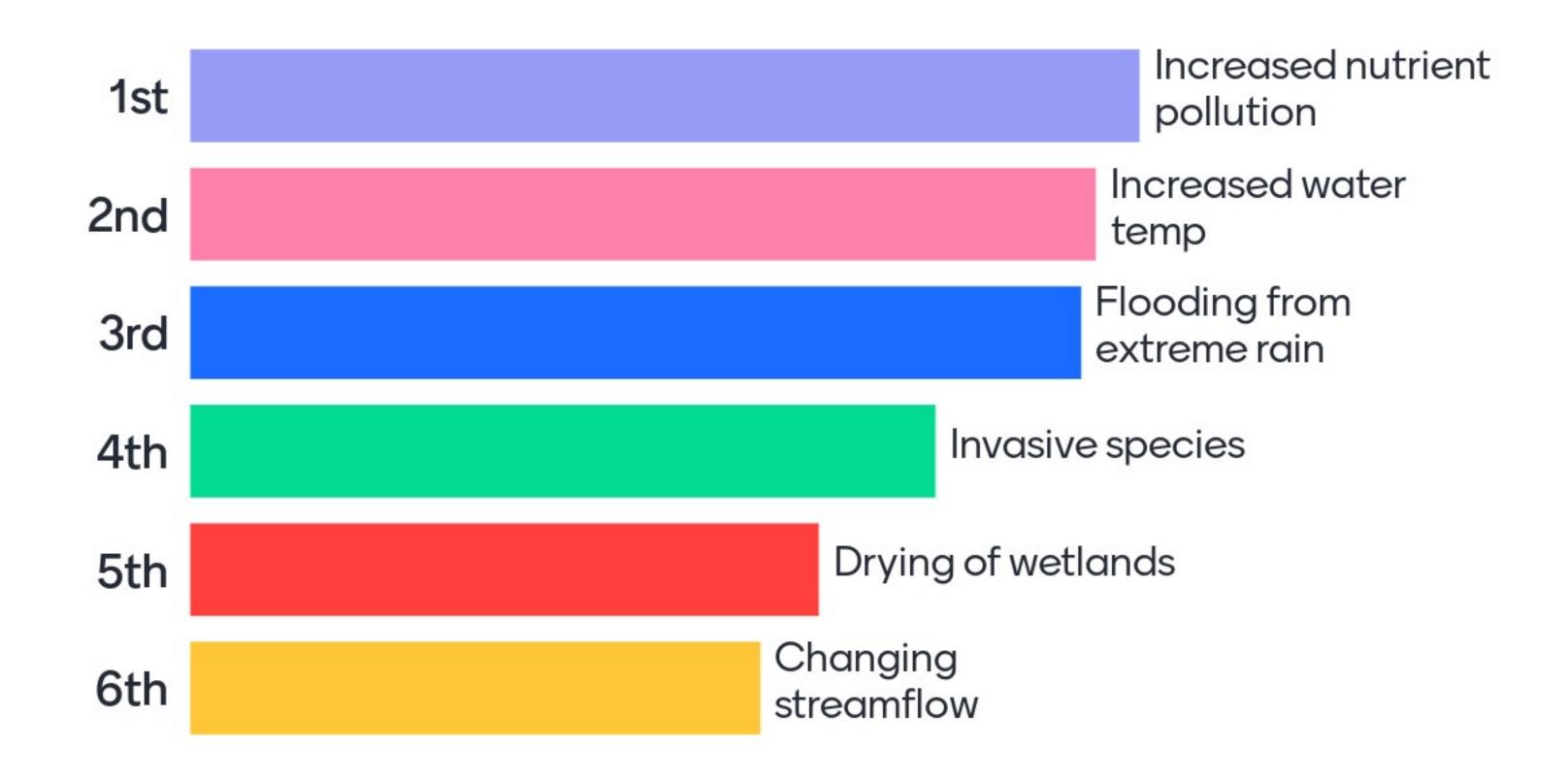

Re: Contract for Grassed Waterway Project

As part of a Great Lakes Commission (GLC) grant, the MACC hired an engineering firm to design a grassed waterway project for a farmer in Zeeland Township. ODC Network and Ottawa Conservation District (OCD) staff have been coordinating this project with the landowner and the engineer. On June 10, an advertisement for bids to construct the project was published with bids due on July 11 at 3pm. A pre-bid meeting was held at the project site on June 17. No bids were received by the deadline of July 11, so the bid due date was extended to July 18 at 9am.

Our team desires to hire **Lakeshore Outdoors** to construct the grassed waterway project. The landowner will sign an agreement with the MACC to provide 5% of the project cost and agree to maintain the project for a period of at least 10 years. ODC Network and OCD staff will provide construction oversight throughout the project.

Staff is in the process of finalizing language for a contract with Lakeshore Outdoors and is asking for authorization to enter into a contract for construction services for an amount not to exceed \$70,850. As stated above the landowner is responsible for 5% of the project cost (\$3,543). The GLC grant will cover \$38,952 of the project cost with the balance being paid by ODC Network with Project Clarity funds (\$28,355).

The MACC staff is seeking your approval of a new work item in the FY2023 Unified Work Program. (ACTION REQUIRED)

Under section 3.0 Special Projects and Studies, there will be a new work item – 3.3 I-196 BL Crossing Study. This crossing study will be Advance Constructed in FY22 but will be using FY23 unprogrammed funds.

Below is what will be inserted into the MACC's FY23 UWP:

3.3 I-196 BL Crossing Study

Objectives

The Macatawa Area Coordinating Council (MACC), along with project partners at the Macatawa River Greenway (MRG), City of Zeeland, Zeeland Charter Township, City of Holland, and Holland Charter Township, in partnership with the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT), wishes to contract with a consultant to provide professional traffic engineering services to assist in the preparation of identifying locations for developing improved, safe non-motorized crossing(s) along the I-196 Business Loop (BL) corridor between US-31 and 88th Avenue.

Procedures and Tasks

- Analyze the current and future traffic characteristics and conditions of I-196 BL, including evaluation
 of freight needs on and around the corridor.
- Evaluate the ability of the existing network of streets and non-motorized facilities along the I-196 BL corridor to accommodate existing and future transportation needs
- Identify feasible crossing location(s) that will provide the most cost-effective, safe, and usable setting
 for non-motorized traffic while minimizing impacts to mobility on I-196 BL, and cross streets and
 driveways in the vicinity of proposed crossings.

- Formulate and analyze several alternatives for the street and sidewalk network to optimize and enhance mobility for all users
- Investigate the potential of mid-block crossings, including bridges or tunnels, in the study area and identify areas where these improvements or some other alternative could be used depending on current/future pedestrian movements
- Come up with cost estimates for crossing options
- Identify potential utility and environmental impacts
- Develop a strategy and identify local funding opportunities to tie into any future construction or improvements along the corridor by MDOT

Overall Impact/Products

Overall, the goal is to develop a transportation strategy that will allow pedestrians and bicycles to access the MRG trail and other regional pathways, parks, and business districts to be included in MDOT's 2024 I-196 BL Reconstruct. The MACC would like to include final recommendations for the street and sidewalk network to optimize and enhance mobility for all users.

The MACC staff is seeking your approval for agreement as to how the FY23-26 unprogrammed funds were divided. (ACTION REQUIRED)

The MACC had unprogrammed IIJA money for FY23-26 and it was divided up between the MACC's members at the 07/11/22 TAC Meeting. Each FY year there was available Carbon Reduction, STP, and STP Flex money.

Below is how each year was divided up:

2023

Carbon Reduction - \$151,134 TOTAL | Split 50/50 between Holland Twp and Laketown Twp Holland Twp - \$75,567 Laketown Twp - \$75,567

Re: FY 2020-2023 TIP Amendments

The MACC staff is seeking your approval for the following FY20-23 amendments. (ACTION REQUIRED)

<u>JN: 212204</u> – 64th Ave at CSX Transportation in Zeeland Township, Ottawa County. The project description is "widen south roadway approaches". This is simply a budget increase. (ACTION REQUIRED)

NO JN YET – I-196 Business Loop Crossing Study. Limits are from 88th Ave to US-31. The study will cost \$100,000 and will use the typical 80/20 match. The MACC will be paying \$80,000 via FY23 STP unprogrammed money. As for the \$20,000, the Executive Director suggests \$10,000 from the MACC, \$2,500 from Holland Township, \$2,500 from the City of Holland, \$2,500 from Zeeland Township, and \$2,500 from the City of Zeeland. (ACTION REQUIRED)
